

- Inspiring the Future and Future First recruit volunteers from business to go to schools and talk about their own routes into HE and the professions

## Innovative partnerships: NNCOs



pre-16 outreach

- 73% gained a university place
- 93% said mentoring increased their passion for learning
- Based on this, set up a new project in three rural & coastal regions
- Up to 1800 school pupils supported









## Innovative partnerships: HEIs

#### **Birmingham City University**

- First year students are mentored by final year students to support transition to university.
- Final year students are mentored on employability skills by alumni working in the area.
- Often, students move through all three tiers mentees becoming mentors. Benefits mentees AND mentors.

"telling [my mentee] what to expect at university, making them aware of the problems I had and how to deal with them and giving advice has built up my confidence, made me more independent and given me better people skills"
