

Three ideas for how widening access data should inform policy

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Idea one: find equity/excellence win/wins

- 1. HEIs use excellence as a get-out-of-jail-free card
 - Don't want to "lower standards"
 - Can't "fix the mistakes" of families/schools
- 2. Gather the evidence of how diversity supports excellence e.g. innovation in teams, research breakthroughs
- 3. Show the performance of WP students in degree results e.g. contextualised admissions

Idea two: agree on <u>one</u> headline metric

- 1. Look at the school system GCSE results, Ofsted judgements, free school meals
- 2. Make sense to past/present/future students AND their families (the grandma test)
- 3. Win the public debate, don't talk about institutionspecific measures or uniqueness

Idea three: focus on individual data

- 1. In an era where Google, Facebook and Amazon can predict our preferences
- 2. Need to focus on individual and personalised data, not area measures
- 3. The Office for Students has more powers than HEFCE and OFFA and will be demanding better data get ahead of the curve
