Improving student attainment is at the heart of our approach



Our evidence shows that **our students achieve better grades than their peers,** particularly at GCSE.





On average, TAP students made half a grade more progress than their peers in their tutored subject at GCSE.


The more tutorials they attend, the bigger the impact. Students who attended more than 20 tutorials in Year 11 made 0.8 of a grade more progress than their peers

Our programme achieves impact on access to top UK universities





Students supported by The Access Project are **twice as likely** to go to a top university than similar student nationally last year



And our impact has been repeatedly externally verified



The Access Project is the only university access organisation in the UK to be validated at Level 3 by Nesta, meaning:



"an organisation's **intervention is causing the impact**, by showing less impact amongst those who don't receive the product or service."

And the Office for Students identified The Access Project as one of three organisations working through partnerships to widen participation through an impact focused approach to raise academic attainment in schools.



The University Readiness Framework

Knowledge

about university applications, choices, student life and finance

Motivation

to attend a top university and the ability to convincingly articulate it

Academic Results

Independence

to complete actions and actively engage in out of school activities to develop academic interests

Academic Self-efficacy

to develop the self-awareness and selfbelief required to achieve academic success

Our learnings

The big picture



- Mentoring and tuition compliment each other to drive attainment. Focus on subject-specific skills and knowledge through 1-to-1 tuition AND on wider meta-cognition and learning skills through mentoring
- Support must be long-term, sustained and intensive
- Recruitment of students should be targeted
- To achieve this impact takes many stakeholders including students, schools, parents, teachers, tutors and programme staff. As such it needs close management as well as regular programme development and evaluation of outcomes to drive year on year improvements

On mentoring for university readiness



- Mentors must be well-trained and highly skilled practitioners.
 Mentoring activities should be quality assured
- Mentors need regular contact and positive working relationships with teachers, tutors, parents and students
- Mentors need up-to-date information about how students are doing academically
- Mentoring should follow an outcomes framework which allows you to deliver consistency from student to student and identify how students are doing at any given point, at a granular level



On one-to-one tuition







- Tutors must be well-trained and supported throughout their time as a tutor
- Tutors need access to quality resources and teacher input
- Raising attainment requires higher intensity at A Level than at GCSE
- Tuition must be quality assured
- It's not easy to get a student to attend 20+ weekly tutorials, they need to be supported and encouraged by the programme staff and school
- Online tutorials help you to support students living outside of cities
