'Overall, the fact that Gypsy, Romany, and Traveller pupils tend to have low prior Attainment [on entering KS3], have Special Educational Needs and are entitled to Free School Meals is likely to be affected by cultural factors.' GRT students are 11 times less likely to enter HE than any other group (3% contrasted with 10% for CLAs, for example) - No funding available to GRT uni applicants — HEIM Conf 2017

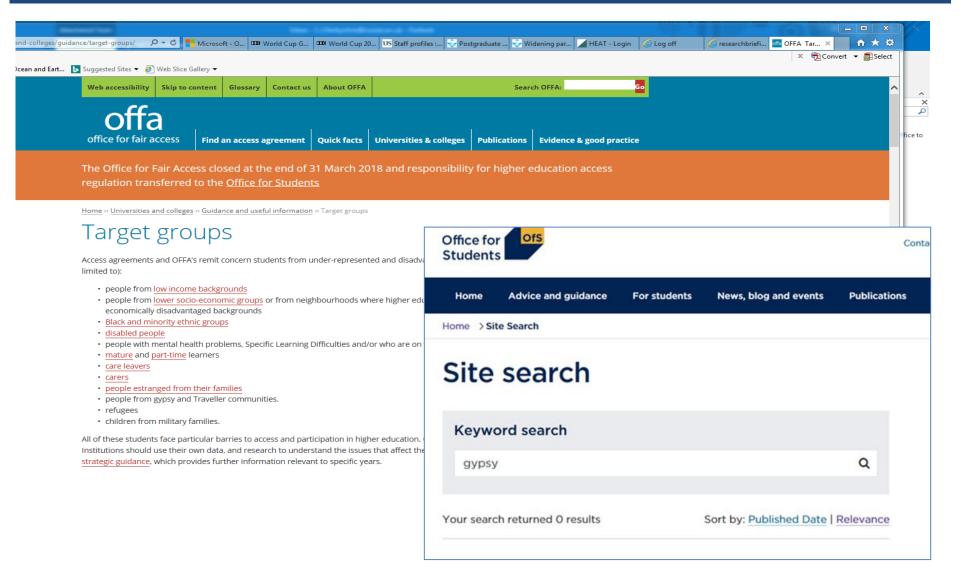


Widening Participation?

Number-crunching

- ONS Census survey analysis suggests 58,000 people declaring themselves as GRT
- Ofsted Report 'Overcoming Barriers' suggests in 2014 19,000 young learners
- Only 200 went to university last year, experts estimate, roughly 3-4 per cent

Project

Rationale: When you contrast the fortunes of CLA students with that of the GRT community in the education system it would appear that despite both facing challenging barriers one group receives a more positive-loaded support and empathy than the other.

Objectives

Children from gypsy, traveller or Romany backgrounds make up a "hugely disproportionate" number of inmates in youth prisons, figures reveal.

One in 10 (11%) of those held in secure training centres (STCs) said they were from these groups, despite making up an estimated 0.1% of the overall population.

In addition, one in 12 detainees (8%) at youth offender institutes (YOIs) considered themselves to be gypsy, Romany or traveller.

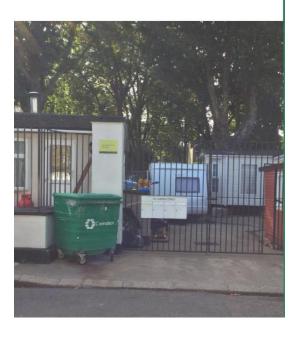
