

Hartlepool, North East of England

- Top 5 for workless households in 2014/15
- Low car ownership (35.3%)
- High numbers of students with no qualifications (30.7%), or Level 1/2 only (29.7%)
- Low participation rates in HE
- POLAR3 Quintile 1 Ward
- In 2016/17, 59% of students were POLAR3 1/2 & Acorn 5

The Evidence

- Disadvantaged students have lower aspirations than their wealthier counterparts
- Education has an impact on whether working class students believe HE is 'for the likes of them'
- Disadvantaged students lack familial support in their aspirations
- White working class boys lack cultural capital to navigate the admissions field
